ARTS AND CULTURE: A KEY DRIVER OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- The importance of the arts and culture sector as a vehicle for sustainable development is widely recognized in Canada's Francophone minority communities. The essential front-line services offered by our member organizations provide French-speaking Canadians with access to their cultures. This directly contributes to community vitality and the ability to live in French.
- The arts and culture sector is fundamental to socio-economic growth in the Canadian and Acadian Francophonie (outside Quebec), employing more than 26,000 people and generating more than \$1.16 billion annually. The sector is recognized as one of the most important drivers of development in Canada's Francophone minority communities.

A VALUED PARTNER

On the political level, the FCCF pursues engagement with federal agencies to resolve issues affecting the Francophone arts and culture sector. It also makes substantial contributions to the public policy development process.

The Collaboration Agreement for the Development of Arts and Culture in the Francophone Minority Communities of Canada, jointly administered by the FCCF and the Department of Canadian Heritage since 1998, provides a framework for this working relationship.

POLICY PRIORITIES

- Positioning the arts and culture sector as an essential driver of sustainable development, in both economic and social terms. In all regions of the country and across all disciplines, the FCCF's member organizations and their partners provide services that underpin the vitality of local communities. The ability to live in French depends on a connection with Francophone culture.
- Ensuring more equitable access to arts and culture funding in the context of support for sustainable cultural development, for improving community well-being and for rebuilding a sector that is essential to a viable economic recovery.
- Reforming Canada's Employment Insurance program in a way that allows the social safety net to provide more equitable protection for those working in the sector.
- Reforming the Broadcasting Act in a way that fully acknowledges the specific needs of the Canadian Francophonie and promotes the creation and enhancement of French-language content, all while protecting Canada's cultural sovereignty.
- Modernizing the Official Languages Act in a way that promotes substantive equality, that strengthens the implementation of positive measures in the sector and that facilitates access to culture, all to ensure the sustainable development of Francophone minority communities.
